This article is devoted to builders, This cuneiform text is one of the collection of the Iraq museum bearing the IM-160420; Its complete tablet deals with expenditure (zi-ga) of (guru) builders from several cities dated to the reign of (d. u-sin) the fourth king of UrIII Dynasty (six year).

Moreover, the cuneiform texts provide us with such information about these kinds of workers,their kinds ,rations and wages, but here we speak about one kind of worker (the builder)

Types of Professional Workers(builder)

Here are some other workers in connection with the building worker:

According to the content of the text studied here ,and the personal names (d.IM-kaskal-kur)(Akk.^d.adad - illatu)(line 11)⁽⁶¹⁾,(šu-kab) which occur in Garshana and Drehem texts⁽⁶²⁾,we can imagine that the Provence of our text may be either Garshana or Drehem.

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



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
