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### Literal Translation and Its Impact on Political Terms Translation

Media translation requires flexible and precise specifications for translating global news content, especially when translating from English to Arabic. This translation process involves converting news articles and reports about a variety of local and international events, such as interviews, symposia, conferences, and other significant local, regional, and international events. In addition to these challenges, an experienced translator often struggles to determine the best way to handle complex issues when working on a large project. Translators sometimes translate Arabic words used in politics without adding more specific words, opting instead for a literal version or adding extra words to clarify the meaning. While this approach may lead to doubts about the translator's ability to fully understand the words, it can also hinder the accurate transmission of the complete message to individuals seeking thorough comprehension.

Just as a military commander develops his specialized abilities by concentrating on armored units or aviation squadrons, press editors build their competency on at least three years of experience in the news department. What happens, one wonders, when the interpreter decides to work as a journalist? **This study aims** to find out how translating experiences affect journalistic performance and how these translationrelated abilities might help to advance and enhance journalism practices.

**Research Problem:** This paper aims to examine the challenges faced by media translators when dealing with political terms.

News constitutes the driving force of media practice and serves as the foundation for all other forms of media. As long as news remains at the heart of the media process, and its cornerstone, the story of news to the recipient resembles a person's relationship with their home. In order to feel comfortable, it must be formulated in a soothing manner, presented in a attention-grabbing fashion, and include facts that matter to the audience, compelling them to pursue it. This can only be achieved through coherent sentences and familiar vocabulary. Just like a house's furniture that provides stability, news sentences and their vocabulary serve as the infrastructure for its delivery". (Masri, 2010, p. 9) Hence the importance of media translation, as a contemporary approach to language mediation within media. The emergence of this particular mode of translation predates its development in the Arab world, having first evolved in Europe and other regions across the globe. The television interpretation system in Europe originated during the early 1960s, which coincided with the period of the Cold War. Following this, there were political transformations that necessitated live reporting from areas of conflict and interviews with local figures and analysts, which bestowed worldwide significance upon the television interpretation provided by networks such as CNN, BBC, and other similar broadcasting channels. Television interpretation was first introduced in certain non-English-speaking nations during the initial months of 1969, specifically to facilitate the live broadcast of the Apollo moon landing on television. The media landscape in the Arab world exhibited distinct characteristics during the period preceding the 1990s, with the establishment of satellite channels marking a significant turning

point. The commencement of space broadcasting can be traced back to Egypt during the early 1960s (Al-Asadi, 2020, p. 11)

### 2. Political Terms

Political language is intricately intertwined with the historical development of political thought, thereby encompassing the documentation of pertinent data and factual information pertaining to noteworthy legal and regional transformations, global political events, as well as wars and treaties.

Political language terms is closely linked to the specific language used in political philosophy. This is particularly crucial in the political domain, where language reflects specific values, concepts, and experiences that shape a distinct reality.

## 2.1 key outline requirements that should be considered when translating political terms

When translating political terms, it is crucial for the translator to uphold objectivity and impartiality consistently. The interpreter should aim to maintain an unbiased and objective stance to accurately convey the intended message without any personal or subjective influences. The translator upholds these principles to maintain the integrity and trustworthiness of political discussions and to guarantee fairness and neutrality in translated content. Translators must strive to remain objective and neutral to guarantee the precision and integrity of the translated material. Translators can maintain impartiality and fairness in their work by refraining from introducing any political bias. By adopting this approach, we ensure that terms are communicated clearly and objectively, eliminating any possibility of distortion or bias influenced by personal affiliations.

In the realm of interpretation, it is of utmost importance to maintain the true essence of political terms in the source language, without any bias or distortion from the translator's personal viewpoint.

One crucial aspect of effective interpretation is the development of a profound comprehension of the context in which political terms are employed and the consequential implications associated with them. This practise facilitates the individual in attaining precise and suitable translation outcomes.

One potential strategy for enhancing clarity and minimising bias in the realm of political discourse involves engaging in direct communication with subject matter experts. By seeking out and engaging with individuals who possess specialised knowledge and expertise in the field of politics, one can gain valuable insights that can aid in the clarification and comprehension of complex terminologies. In order for the translator to effectively address the challenges associated with political affiliation, it is imperative that they actively strive to uphold impartiality, accuracy, and credibility in their translation endeavours. This can be achieved by developing a comprehensive understanding of the source texts from which they are translating, particularly considering the linguistic nuances and complexities that have emerged within the political discourse. By doing so, the translator can ensure that the translated texts are presented at a level that aligns with the standards observed in the realm of daily journalism.

When a translator opts for machine translation to translate political terms, they allow technology to determine the term's linguistic meaning. However, it's crucial to remember that this approach necessitates avoiding the skepticism that a given interpretation merely reflects a particular perspective on the term, not the political meaning of the term itself. It necessitates that the 'genius' of a language influences only its surface structures, not its deep structures, which are purportedly universal across all languages.

International adoption of this term's translation is only possible when there is a comparison between terms and their meanings. This allows for a clear and seamless translation, enabling a global perspective that aligns with political logic, as it reveals the structures inherent in one's native language.

The surface translation levels of the various languages do differ, but usage bias frequently corrupts these differences, leading to misunderstandings. see (Eco, 1995, p. 314)

The translator's engagement with the task of updating news and the difficulties encountered in balancing time constraints and translation accuracy while translating political terms from English to Arabic pose significant challenges that necessitate the application of advanced skills and effective strategies. The aforementioned relationship exemplifies the intricate equilibrium between the dedication to deliver swift translation services and upholding the precision and excellence of the translated content. see (SÁROSI-MÁRDIROSZ, 2014, p. 163).

### 2.2 The translation process is fraught with many difficulties, such as: The Speed of Translation:

The translator is faced with a situation necessitating prompt translation of contemporary political news. The presence of time constraints can potentially have a detrimental impact on the quality of translation, posing challenges to the task of maintaining accuracy in the translated text.

The maintenance of translation accuracy and the provision of precise conceptual translation of political terms are imperative for the translator, even under time constraints. The process necessitates the verification of the accurate definition of the term and the subsequent clarification of said definition in order to more accurately convey the original intended meaning. One important factor to consider in the interpretation of political news is the significance of the political context in which a term is employed and the subsequent impact on its translation. The appropriateness of translation is contingent upon the contextual factors that encompass the term in text.

To effectively carry out their responsibilities, translators must stay informed about political advancements and the latest updates pertaining to the terminologies they are translating. This process facilitates the revision and adaptation of translations to accurately represent recent and evolving occurrences. See( (Doherty, 2016, p. 953)

One method that translators can employ to enhance and expedite the translation process is the utilisation of technical tools, such as automated translation and editing software. These tools serve to streamline the overall workflow and increase efficiency in the translation endeavour. The utilisation of such tools can prove advantageous in managing time constraints; however, it is imperative to exercise caution in excessively depending on these tools as a means to guarantee precision.

With their commercial debut in the 1990s, computer-assisted translation (CAT) tools provided the first major technological shift in the present-day translation industry, increasing the availability and affordability of computing power and the Internet.

The core of CAT tools is a translation memory (TM), a software program that stores a translator's translated text alongside its original source text so that these pairs can later be reused in full or in part when the translator is

tasked with translating texts of a similar linguistic composition. See( (Doherty, 2016, p. 951)

The translator's ability to stay updated with news and maintain a balance between time constraints and translation accuracy poses a significant challenge. Consequently, translators must adequately prepare and employ advanced strategies to effectively address this issue. The element of time in journalism holds considerable significance in the translation of news content as a whole. In situations where timely information is of utmost importance, translators often encounter challenges due to limitations in time and space. These limitations limit their capacity to accurately correct and communicate urgent information within a limited timeframe. Consequently, these restrictions impose psychological burdens on television translators, manifesting as heightened levels of journalism. (Al-Asadi, 2020, p. 25)

### **The Cognitive Difficulties**

The translator's understanding and incorporation of cultural and historical elements play a pivotal role in the proper and comprehensible translation of political language from English to Arabic. The relationship between political terms and culture and history is frequently intertwined. It is crucial for translators to possess a comprehensive understanding of this connection in order to deliver translations that faithfully capture the intended meaning and contextual nuances.

The translator must demonstrate a profound comprehension of cultural nuances, linguistic proficiency, and the intended objectives. It is advisable

for him to acquire knowledge regarding the cultures, traditions, and values inherent in the political and historical contexts of both countries. These characteristics have the potential to significantly influence the understanding and interpretation of various concepts and phenomena.

Prior to translating political terms, translators must conduct a crucial cultural and historical analysis. It is imperative for translators to thoroughly examine the cultural and historical context that surrounds the specific term in question. Understanding the historical development of events and concepts is crucial in facilitating a more precise and reliable process of translation.

One important aspect to consider is the appreciation of cultural differences, particularly when it comes to political terms. It is crucial to recognise that the meanings of political phrases can vary among languages and cultures. The translator must exhibit sensitivity towards these variations and include them into their translation. See (SÁROSI-MÁRDIROSZ, 2014, p. 161)

Historical influences play a crucial role in the interpretation process since translators need to possess a comprehensive awareness of how past events have shaped the understanding and terms of the target language. The perception and meanings of a phrase may be influenced by historical factors.

The translator must integrate linguistic and cognitive translation standards to produce a translation that maintains the precision of the political term while also embodying the values and characteristics of the target culture.

Continuous research and development are essential for translators to ensure their preparedness in understanding and acquiring knowledge on cultural and historical issues relevant to political terms. This process contributes to the enhancement of translation quality.

In conclusion, the translator must profoundly comprehend the cultural and historical factors that influence political terms. This enables him to deliver precise and comprehensible translations that accurately convey both the intended content and the contextual nuances.

### 3. Challenges of Literal Translation in Television journalism

The translation of political terms poses a significant challenge for translators, with literal translation introducing further intricacies. Nonetheless, the primary objective of literal translation remains the faithful representation of the original text, whether in English or Arabic. For instance, the term "subtitle" does not retain a consistent meaning across contexts (Qutub, 2008, p. 27). Numerous hurdles arise when endeavoring to translate political terms directly from English to Arabic, with the following key issues warranting consideration:

Cultural Disparities: Political terms serves as a reflection of distinct political concepts and systems intrinsic to individual languages and cultures. Verbatim translation necessitates the accurate transmission of the term's cultural and political connotations. 2. Linguistic Variances: Languages exhibit structural and regulatory differences, rendering the literal translation of political terms potentially unsuitable for the linguistic framework of the target language.

3. Divergent Usages: Political terms often hold varying applications within each language. A literal translation can engender semantic loss or inappropriateness within a given context.

4. Regional Dialects and Vernacular: Discrepancies between regional dialects and vernaculars in both languages can emerge. A literal translation may prove incongruous with the formal or cultural milieu.

5. Political Abbreviations and Symbols: Certain political terms encompass symbols and abbreviations that diverge between languages. These symbols may necessitate distinct translations or explanatory annotations.

6. Ambiguity and Complexity: Certain terms encapsulate multiple intricate meanings. A literal translation may struggle to accurately convey all of these nuances (Awad, 2008, p. 106).

In light of these considerations, the translator must possess a profound comprehension of the political discourse in order to effectuate precise translations. Employing diverse methodologies is imperative to furnish forthright and meaningful translations that remain tethered to the cultural ethos of the respective state. This underscores the translator's evolving role, obligating them to maintain alignment with global progress and international developments (Hadid, 2010, p. 233).

# 4. Essential Precepts Prior to Embarking on the Translation of Political Texts

1. It is advisable to peruse the entire segment or text before commencing the translation endeavor. This practice significantly facilitates the translation process. In situations where this might not be feasible, such as examinations or assessments designed to gauge the translator's speed alongside their proficiency and translation accuracy, like those conducted by Reuters Agency and BBC, for instance, at the very least, reading the paragraph prior to translation is imperative. This is to avert any errors or shortcomings in the translation process.

2. It is essential to read the paragraph before embarking on either a literal translation adhering to the original text or a translation of the meaning (paraphrased translation focusing on conveying the essence of the meaning rather than the exact wording), akin to the translation methods employed in most newspapers and Egyptian and Arabic radio and television stations.

However, the translator remains constrained by the guidelines of the media institution they are affiliated with, which at times follows a "meaning-based translation" approach when rendering English to Arabic translations. This approach may necessitate certain adjustments to ensure congruence between the phrasing and the style of the Arabic language. For example, the phrase "producing results" might be translated in the Arabic text as "literat adjustment translation of "literat", as the latter would appear inelegant.

For instance, consider the exjournalismion "The ball is in your court." If translated literally, it would read "الكرة في ملعبك." However, in English, this phrase conveys the idea that the decision or responsibility now rests with the person addressed. The literal translation strips this phrase of its positive connotation.

Essentially, the translator's task goes beyond simply converting words from one language to another. It involves skillfully transferring the intended meaning and impact, taking into account linguistic nuances and cultural context.

The predicament lies in the fact that in some languages, the phrase " روح " could be construed negatively, suggesting an endorsement of chaos or violence. However, "Revolutionary spirit" conveys determination and positive change in English.

Similar misunderstandings can arise from incorrect interpretation of political symbols and signals, exemplified by "Waving the white flag." The literal translation might appear as "رفع العلم الأبيض," but its intended meaning is surrender, and sometimes it's used as a symbol of a truce.

In another intricate realm, the issue of misrepresentation or bias emerges when translating certain terms such as "Peaceful protesters." The translation "المحتجون السلميون" could be accurate, but if it's manipulated to portray peaceful protesters negatively or mockingly, it could distort the

original image through the use of negatively charged words or by ridiculing their actions.

Furthermore, inaccuracies in translating political terms can also be problematic, as seen in the translation of "National security" as الأمن " might "The issue lies in the fact that in some languages, "الأمن الوطني" might be narrowly understood as physical security alone, whereas in English, "National security" encompasses safeguarding the economy, politics, and comprehensive challenges.

In essence, the precision of political translation hinges on a profound understanding of the cultural, historical, and linguistic contexts, to ensure that the translated message remains faithful to the original intention, devoid of bias or misinterpretation.

Likewise, in the realm of conflict and struggle: The concept of "نزاع" (nizaa) is considered one of the key parallels to "صراع" (sira') or conflict. At first glance, translating the concept of "conflict" from both French and English into Arabic poses a formidable challenge, presenting the initial obstacle for the translator. Ibn Manzur distinguished between "نزاع" (nizaa) and "نزاع" (sira') in his lexicon "Lisan al-Arab," viewing "صراع" (nazaa) as disputation and "صراع" (sira') as contention. He perceived "صراع" (sira') and "صراع" (muṣāra'a) as indications of intense confrontation, wherein one endeavor to overpower the other. Various foreign encyclopedias regard "صراع" (sira') as implying "fierce argument" or "struggle against others," whereas "نزاع" (nizaa) refers to "disagreement," "contradiction," or "competition of ideas." This signifies that "نزاع" (nizaa) represents a preliminary stage to "صراع" (sira') and might not necessarily escalate to the level of "تنزاع" (sira'), thus indicating that "نزاع" (nizaa) possesses less intensity and comprehensiveness than "صراع" (sira') (Abkar, 2022, p. 99).

These examples highlight how significant semantic variations can occur among different languages and cultures. The precision of selecting the appropriate meaning in the required context becomes evident, underscoring the translator's responsibility for caution and accuracy to evade these pitfalls. This is essential to ensure the accurate and proper conveyance of meaning, while avoiding cultural and linguistic complexities inherent in the translation of political terms.

### **Conclusion:**

Translating political terms requires a deep understanding of both the source and target cultures and languages and a deep understanding of customs, traditions, and values intertwined with politics and history. This understanding can significantly impact the meanings and interpretations of political terms. An in-depth cultural and historical analysis of the surrounding context is crucial, as it helps guide more accurate translations. Cultural disparities are important, as political terms may hold distinct meanings across different languages and cultures. Translators must navigate these variations sensitively and reflect them in their translations. Historical context also plays a crucial role in shaping the perception and meanings of terms. Translations must be fitting and intelligible for the target reader without causing discomfort or confusion. Harmonizing linguistic and cultural translation standards is essential, as it ensures that political terms remain precise while reflecting the intended culture. Continuous research and development are also essential, as it enhances the quality of translations, ensuring accuracy and cultural alignment.

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
