Eco-Consciousness in Samuel Taylor Coleridge's 'The Rime of the Ancient Mariner

This study investigates how Coleridge's Romantic sensibilities align with contemporary ecological thought, emphasizing the poet's vision of nature as a living, sacred entity. By analyzing key passages and their ecological implications, this research highlights The Rime of the Ancient Mariner as a foundational text for eco-criticism and a timeless call for environmental stewardship.

Moreover, Coleridge's Sea is symbolic of the forces of nature that go beyond human control or comprehension. The ship's crew, after the killing of the albatross, finds themselves subject to the will of the sea. The sea becomes a mirror of the Mariner's internal moral conflict—while calm at first, it shifts to turmoil and punishment as the Mariner faces the consequences of his actions. The image of the becalmed ship stranded in the middle of a vast, empty ocean vividly illustrates humanity's powerlessness in the face of nature's unpredictable and uncontrollable forces. This can be interpreted as a metaphor for the human race's struggle against environmental degradation. When we act thoughtlessly or selfishly, we disrupt the balance of



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nature, and nature responds with consequences that often seem out of our control. The modern environmental crisis mirrors this scenario: human actions—whether through pollution, deforestation, or overexploitation of resources—have led to climate change and ecological collapse, forces that seem as uncontrollable as the natural elements in Coleridge's poem.

One of the most compelling aspects of Coleridge's The Rime of the Ancient Mariner is the spiritual and religious undercurrent that permeates the poem, especially in the portrayal of nature's sanctity. The albatross itself can be interpreted as a symbol of divine intervention—an emissary of nature's sacredness. Its killing by the Mariner, a sin in the eyes of nature, invites divine retribution, showing that the natural world is a reflection of a higher moral order. This religious interpretation can be extended to contemporary eco-theology, which draws parallels between human stewardship of the earth and moral responsibility.

The poem of the of the ancient mariner gives the nature its role via many key literary devices of how nature influences human beings and determine their existence. One of the main themes in the poem is the nature creature sanctity since the death of one creature by the sailor starts to reshape the fate of the ship and sends them into a trip of danger. Moreover, the crew knowledge of the sin as the creature of sea is one of the god's creatures which bring to the action link of nature and religion.

The center theme also gives the link between death and live and the difference between both as the death of this creature leads to the misfortune and suffer for the whole crew. The actual situation remarks to the anger of nature and revenge as it is known to the society's nature is bigger and effective more than humans and can determine fate in ways that bring environmental shifts. Thus, in such conditions dark romanticism appears and make the shape of the poem to be a warning in order to maintain nature and provide its creatures the position of sanctity.

The ecocritical dimensions make it notable that it is a case of conflict between nature and human where weakness of one creature equals weakness of bunch of human beings. The anger of nature



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overshadow fate of humans and ignorance leads to dark fate. The different creatures of sea start to attack and to express anger toward the ship which changes since sea depict calmness until the death of one bird. Serpents that take an action is one of ancient creatures that give the poem the dimension of both religion and environment. The sea become the main enemy to the ship while the other creatures are Mainor. The sailors know that it is due to the mistreatment of one creature and that journey fate is now different.

Therefore, the divinity of one creature leads to the understanding that both nature and human beings affect each other and one element can start the anti-interaction between both. Moreover, the ancient relationship between the nature and human being since it focusses of one of the natural elements, which is the sea. The sailors and sea find direct link through the poem and religion provide the poem the better and deeper meanings since the way one element represents unity of nature. The water becomes "slimy" and "rotten," and the ship is stranded in a lifeless ocean, reflecting the mariner's moral transgression. The sea, in this sense, acts as a judge and enforcer of natural law, punishing the mariner for his violation of the sacred bond between humanity and nature.

in this poem also the poet used the wind as a spirit that can either aid or hinder the mariner's journey. When the ship is becalmed after the killing of the albatross, the absence of wind signifies a loss of divine favor and a stagnation of life. Later, when the mariner begins to repent, the wind returns, symbolizing renewal and the possibility of redemption. The wind, therefore, is not just a natural phenomenon but an active participant in the moral and spiritual journey of the characters.
